NCUA Issues Prohibition Order

ALEXANDRIA, Va. (Dec. 8, 2011) – The National Credit Union Administration (NCUA) has issued an order prohibiting the following individual from participating in the affairs of any federally insured financial institution:

- **Jennifer F. Stringer**, a former employee of University of South Alabama Federal Credit Union, Mobile, Ala. was convicted of identity theft. Stringer was sentenced to 10 years in prison; however it was suspended pending good behavior. Additionally, she was sentenced to probation and ordered to pay restitution in the amount of \$43,234.44.

Violation of a prohibition order is a felony offense, punishable by imprisonment and a fine of up to \$1 million.
